Then you realise what a complete fool you must look and you turn in your new YSL Johnny boots to run, but only after first buying the Tom Ford perfume in hopes the sexy man will ask you on a date. But why would he? He's properly thinking to himself, who is this crazy Aussie?

Walking back to my hotel, it dawns on me that I'm totally unhappy with my life back home in Sydney. The three distinct Park City resorts, the Utah Olympic Park and the Main Street district offer an astonishing array of activities for everyone. At any given time during your winter stay, you can experience major sporting events, see independent films at Sundance Film Festival, catch a play or take a gallery stroll on historic Main Street. Sounds cozy, doesn't it?

At the top of my list, however, is the First Welcome Party of Elevation Utah, the 3rd

There's also a bus trip to Salt Lake City on Friday night for a dance party with an influx of local (and may I say cute) boys.

After four days of sex, skiing, and far too many fireballs, I needed another holiday! It was bloody exhausting but so much fun and I really did feel like one of the cool kids. Oh, by the way, I'm feeling a little more gay...

TALKING TO THE SNOW KING ELEVATION BOSS, TOM WHITMAN



DNA: Why did you choose Park City Utah to be your 2nd venue for your Elevation Utah Gay Ski Week parties?

Tom Whitman: After Mammoth Gay Ski Week, I did quite a bit of research looking at what world class resorts did not have

a successful gay ski week, which resorts had venues able to support a ski week as it grows, and which resorts were easy to access from all over the country. Park City came out on top on all the criteria. Plus, everyone knows Utah has the best snow in the world.

This is your 3rd year now. What kind of feedback do you get and why do you feel it works?

Everyone has been really positive and we have people coming back year after year. Elevation Utah is successful because Park City is the epitome of what a ski town should be - great restaurants, quaint vibe, accommodations that range from budget to luxury, the best snow - and because I take producing my ski weeks seriously. I want Elevation Utah to be in the best venues; I want the best Djs; I want cute guys from all over the country, and I want everyone to rave about it when they go home.

Everyone was very welcoming. Do others tell you that? Is this something you try to encourage?

To me, that friendly, gregarious vibe is the most important element of my ski weeks. I write a welcome letter in the Elevation Guide and the one thing I say every year is that the reason we love gay ski weeks is that everyone loses the attitude. You meet tons of people and make new friends that will last a lifetime. I encourage people to introduce themselves to people they don't know and it works.

Utah is well-known as the Mormon state. Can you tell us how locals and businesses feel about having a gay event here?

When I first scouted Park City, I asked people what they thought of a gay ski week in their hometown. Without exception, everyone was excited and supportive. When I asked venue managers or owners, many of them either told me they were gay or that they couldn't wait to invite their gay friends. Park City is very liberal, even compared to places in much less conservative states.

What are your top five tips to having a great Elevation Utah?

1. Leave the big city attitude at sea level. Introduce yourself to new people.
2. Come with your friends, but be open to making new ones.
If you see someone hanging out on their own, say hello and buy them a drink.
3. Drink water and watch your alcohol intake. High altitudes make liquor hit your system much harder.
4. Show up at après-ski in your ski or snowboarding clothes. You don't need to primp and fix your hair until the nighttime party.
5. Say hello to me and my staff. We're here to make sure you have a great time.
